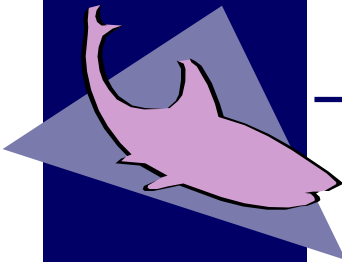

## From Our Classrooms : Pre-Kindergarten 1

---

In Pre K One we are keeping a child centered perspective on learning. As you might have gathered when you walk around the school, Pre K One is different - different in a great way! This is because of the way we do what it is we do. Listening is the key, the teachers listen, the children listen, and we listen to each other. We share our ideas, our stories and our thoughts. We share thoughts on how the classroom should look, where our office should be, where the ballet studio should be.

Since our last issue we have welcomed Ms. Gema and Ms. Catherine to our class. At first, things were a little different for everyone. But the children managed to show them just how we organize our class. Everyone made friends quickly and got down to business. Ms Peterson is very proud of the children's efforts and of being such good ambassadors for the school.

We also had Alp Alptekin join our class and he was the recipient of the Citizenship Award. He received this because every morning Alp comes in and greets all his teachers and friends with a smile on his face, which makes everyone else smile for the rest of the day!!

Pre K One students are accomplished authors and illustrators,

with their latest work being published in the Young Authors book. As a group, the children illustrated the cover for our class and we were inspired by an unusual event that happened while Ms. Peterson was riding her bike to school one day. A ladybug came to school riding on her bike. The ladybug traveled all the way from Prinsenlaan to school and then rode all the way home again. Some children thought she was too tired to fly and others thought she needed to come to school because she wanted to see the children.

Everyone has a special interest and Matthew knows about construction. He has shown us his skill in building really, really big constructions. Matthew says, "I'm going to teach everyone how to make things that don't fall down. You have to make them low, and not too high. I have been practicing to learn that because I build and build and it was always falling down. One day I put cellotape on construction it worked for a bit but it made it look not quite right. So I tried and tried and I put the biggest blocks down first and then the small round ones on top. It made a castle, that's my house!"

Shuto loves trains he paints them,

he builds them with recycled boxes, he makes trains out of Lego, out of the waffles blocks and out of paper. The paper trains need cutting to size and he is very careful with his cutting. With the box trains there are lots of circles, rectangles and squares.

When the class was talking about colors and shapes we all learned a cool song about rainbows. We made our own dancing ribbons and now we know all the colors of the rainbow. Louise loves the colors violet and indigo and she goes home to teach mum, dad and her brother Christopher the song. Actually Louise is the teacher in all her games at home now.

Colors are everywhere you look and painting with color is fun. Many artists are famous because they paint with lots of color and Shiv learnt that Van Gogh liked to paint with lots of color, during our trip up to Amsterdam to the Vincent Van Gogh Museum. Van Gogh sometimes tricked the viewer of his paintings by putting a color in that was not true. He was very tricky. He put a bit of red into his sunflower painting. Shiv's favorite painting is the potato eaters because of the green light. Moe paints magnificent self-portraits just like

During gathering, after we have read all our names, said good morning and asked how everyone is doing, the children have fun with rhyming. Our storybooks are jam-packed with rhyming words. The children noticed that our mat has rhyming words too. Pre K has many favorite storybooks and one of them is Do Whacky Do! The clown and the children at the end of the story dance together. They dance differently from Sage who goes to ballet.

There is a ballet studio in our class,

with costumes, a barre and mirror to do the 5 positions you need to learn. The girls love this and the boys have tried to join in because they know boys can dance too. Just like in the Nutcracker. Aryaa likes to listen to the music composed by Tchaikovsky. He can hear a flute and the violins. But the boys are too busy sometimes in the office and painting to join the girls all the time. No problem! Everyone gets along with everyone most of the time.

Aryaa has always been interested in cars and keys and he is in the

process of building his own car out of recycled boxes. Most of the morning is spent piecing it together. He has had a lot of help from Kiichi, Sage and Roman. They are all learning to work together negotiating on what needs to go where and who can do what.

Last week we spent some of our morning cooking. Everyone got a chance to cook. We have cooked lemonade scones, banana toast and pancakes. Over the coming weeks we will continue to cook. A great song we

## Counselor's Corner

---

Transition time is upon us! It hardly seems possible that the year is almost over. For those of you who have a child in 12th grade this year, you will see them begin the transition from high school to college beginning with their high school graduation on May 31st. Now is the time to remember all the many things that they did in the past 12+ years as they have attended school.

Even though there is transition every year when a child goes into a new grade, perhaps two of the most important ones are the transitions from Elementary School to Middle School, and from Middle School to High School. On Tuesday and Wednesday (May 6 and 7), students in grade 5 will visit Middle School classes for a day. I will be talking with the 5th grade students at the end of April, and if they are anything like the previous classes, I know that they will be excited about being in the Middle School next year. Each child will be assigned to

a 6th grade buddy, visit four classes in the day and participate in a question and answer session at the end of the two days. Some of the 6th graders will form a panel to try and answer questions and help them through the process. This is the fifth year that we have had the 5th graders attend this Transition Day and they do look forward to the experience! Parents of 5th grade students will be receiving a letter from me very soon that gives more details about this special day.

I will also be meeting with the 8th grade class before the end of the year to talk about Transition to High School. They will get information about the Four Year Plan - an academic plan that they will follow in high school. They will learn the terminology that becomes important in high school - credits, transcripts, requirements for graduation and so on. As well, we will have a group of four 9th graders on a student panel to answer questions like "What do I know now, that I wish I had known last year at this

time?" and "How is High School different from Middle School?"

In the early fall, we will plan to have two meetings for parents based on the same information that students will be receiving in the next couple of weeks. Part of the reason for waiting until the fall is to give you a chance to begin the process of transition with your child in the beginning of the new school year. That way when we meet you will have a better a point of context in terms of what they are actually doing in school. We will also have a parent panel made up of some of this year's parents of 6th grade students at the MS meeting, who will share their experiences as their children went through this important transition this year. (What do I know now that I wish I had known a year ago!?) It will also give you a chance to meet and welcome the parents of new students who will be joining AISR.

It is a pleasure to work with your children!
